

Identify who is telling the story at various points in a text.

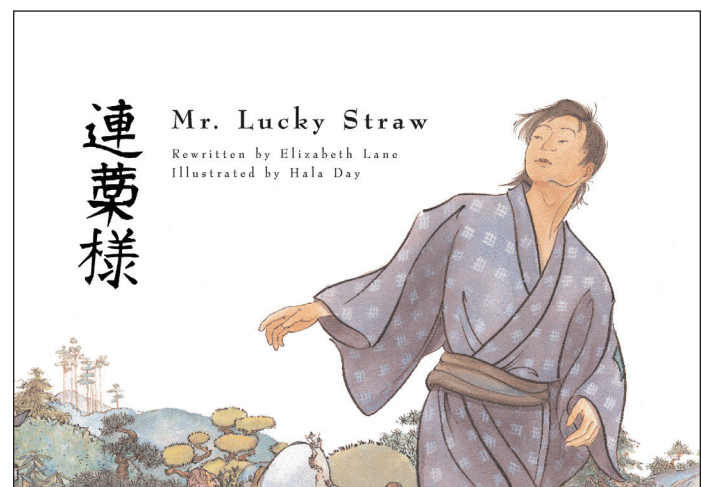
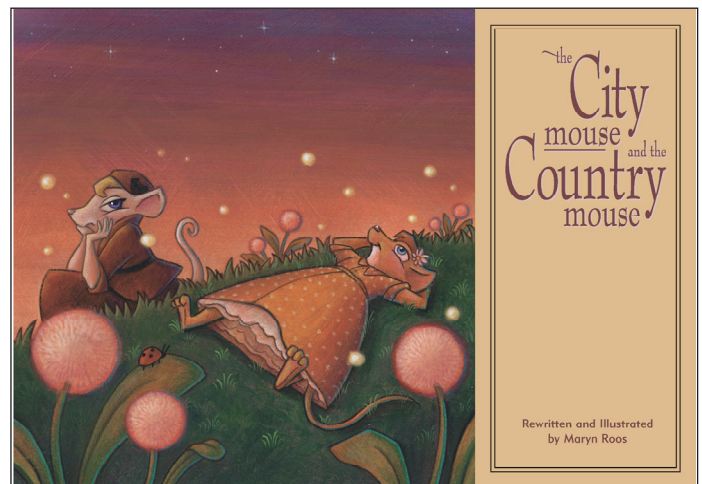
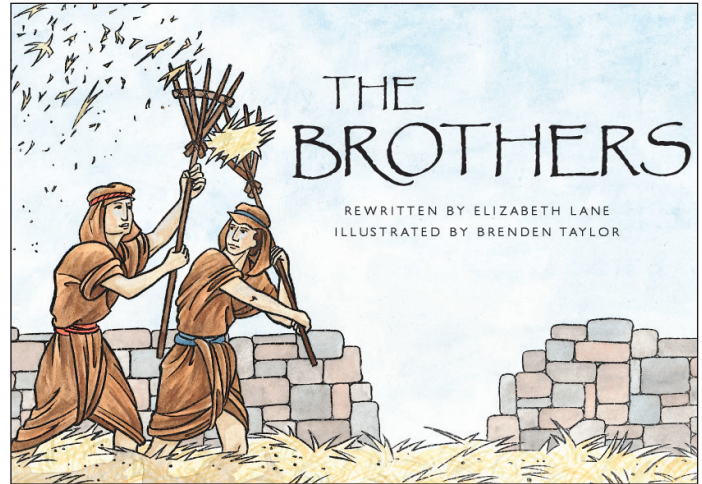
Who Is the Speaker?

This lesson will teach students to identify who is telling the story at various points in a text. Use the books *The Brothers*, *The City Mouse and the Country Mouse* and/or *Mr. Lucky Straw*.

Instruction

In narrative text (or literature), the characters take turns telling the story. We are going to read this story and see who is telling the story as we go through it. When you think there has been a change in who is telling the story, raise your hand to say who is talking in the story now.
